4. Emergency Services

4.1 Primary Care Paramedic

Motion: Recommend Academic Council approve the proposed new Primary Care Paramedic program, effective Fall 2024 with amendments to the following:

- Admission Requirements
- Selection Criteria
- Admission of Indigenous Students
- Progression Criteria

Discussion: NWP has an agreement with Portage College and is using their curriculum to develop the program. This is not a collaboration, Portage has shared their curriculum for NWP to use.

Waiting on approval from Advanced Education and the Alberta College of Paramedics. Expecting to submit the program to the Alberta College of Paramedics at the end of September and expecting to wait about 5-6 months for approval.

Continuance of the program depends on success rates of the students, want to use the selection process to accept the best students.

After completing the program NWP will issue the credential, students then write the national exam. The exam is available four times per year.

Student handbook includes flow charts for if a student is not successful in the placement, based on various reasons for why they are not successful.

Placements – NWP will set up for students.

Program is online delivery, plus 10 onsite weeks.

- Changing Lecture Hours from “6” to “3”.
- Changing Seminar Hours from “0” to “1”.

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- The addition of NP1700 Introduction to Pharmacology (3) as a Co-Requisite effective Fall 2024.

Updated course outline is included in a separate document.

Discussion: Splitting the Pathophysiology and Pharmacology course into 2, 3 credit courses instead of one, 6 credit course. Pathophysiology and Pharmacology are heavy, high attrition courses and implementing these changes will support student success.

Program Description

Primary Care Paramedics (PCPs) are integral members of Emergency Medical Services and provide basic life support, medical and trauma care in health services and industrial settings. They may be the first to arrive on scene, they may be the only provider in remote areas, or they may work collaboratively in a team with other EMS/health care providers, first responders (i.e. Fire, Police) or community support agencies. Duties vary depending on the employment setting but responsibilities for PCPs include patient assessment, treatment, stabilization, and transportation.

Best Qualified

Applicants must be aware of the following important deadlines (in subsequent order):

- October 1st – Applications Open
- March 1st – Application Deadline
- March 15th – Document Deadline
- April 15th – Written exam and Interview

*Applications received after March 1st may not be considered for admission.

Only completed applications will be considered; therefore, all official transcripts and resume must be received by the document deadline of March 15th.

Preference will be given to applicants who are best qualified as determined by an admission scoring system based on academics, adaptability, experience, the general knowledge written exam and selection interview. Should two or more applicants have the same score, the students will be ranked according to the earliest application date. Conditional letters of admission will be mailed to successful applicants. Qualified applicants not selected for admission will be placed on a waitlist according to score.

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As per Northwestern Polytechnic policy, outlined in the admissions section of the calendar, “the institution, at its discretion, “may refuse admission to any applicant”.

Practicum agencies require Police Information Checks (PICs) of students working in their organizations. Information regarding PICs will be provided to students after they have been admitted.

Admission of Indigenous Students

Two (2) seats in the Primary Care Paramedic program will be reserved for qualified applicants of Indigenous ancestry. If the designated applicants do not fill these reserved seats by March 30th, the seats will be offered to the general applicant pool. If applicants are applying as an Indigenous student, they may be required to present proof of Indigenous ancestry.

ADMISSION OF INDIGENOUS STUDENTS

Two (2) seats in the Primary Care Paramedic program will be reserved for qualified applicants of Indigenous ancestry. The top two (2) applications, based on the outcome of the approved scoring system chart, will be selected for offer of admission and will be assigned these reserved seats. If the designated applicants do not fill these reserved seats by March 30th, the seats will be offered to the general applicant pool. If applicants are applying as an Indigenous student, they will be required to present indigenous membership/citizenship documentation for verification purposes.

Progression Criteria

A grade of B- is the minimum passing grade for EM1020, EM2020, EM2030 and EM2500 and a C- is the minimum passing grade for all other PCP courses in the program.

Students that are unsuccessful in EM1800 Ambulance Placement and/or EM1900 Clinical Placements, may require additional courses prior to repeating the placements. If students are unsuccessful in their secondary placement, they must reapply to the PCP program.

1. Critical Thinking Exercises

The objective of this assignment is to develop a comprehensive health promotion and wellness plan that addresses the unique needs of individuals across different stages of the lifespan, focusing on preventive measures, health education, and lifestyle modifications.

Stages – students select one stage from each bullet:

- Newborn or Infant or Toddler or Preschooler or School-Aged Child
- Adolescent or Young Adulthood or Middle Adult or Older Person

Answer the following:

- Research and identify the most prevalent health risks, challenges, and issues commonly faced during this life stage.
- Develop specific health promotion strategies for each age group to address the identified health risks.
- Provide a detailed implementation plan for each health promotion strategy. Discuss potential challenges and how they can be overcome. Consider the involvement of healthcare professionals, families, communities, and other relevant stakeholders.
- Propose methods for evaluating the effectiveness of the health promotion plan for this age group. Identify measurable outcomes and indicators to assess the success of the interventions.

4. Ticket to Class (2.5% each class; 35% total course grade)

Questions will be handed out at the start of each lecture to assess required pre-reading knowledge. This exercise aims to encourage students to keep up with class readings, refresh student memory of subject matter and prepare students to engage in class discussion, which is essential to the function of this course.
